- **The Workers Who Bring you Black Friday.** The Nation. 11/26/2013. “It’s a small but important lesson in what it means to be a “flexible” worker. We are not in control here. Shifts may last four hours, eight hours or twelve; start times will bounce around as well. I’m originally hired for a shift that begins at 7 am, but that later moves up an hour, to 8, and then, in a rush to move goods out the door, to four o’clock in the morning. In the online world of holiday shopping, where demand can surge and retreat with the click of (many) buttons, workers must respond in real time, shoving other commitments aside.” [Read more](#)

The inescapability of poverty weighs so heavily on the author that s/he abandons long-term planning entirely, because the short term needs are so great and the long-term gains so implausible. "Over the past couple of decades, there has been tremendous growth in divorce rates and in the number of unwed births; currently, 35 percent of families with children are headed by a single parent. The trend is even more pronounced in poor families—69 percent—and in African American families—63 percent. These circumstances equate to an elevated need for child support and visitation help—a need that is unlikely to subside anytime soon, even if gains are realized in the areas of family formation, marriage, and keeping families together."
